Esopus Novitiate Reopens...



Sometimes the question is posed, "How does someone become a Brother today?" and "Where are these potential vocations coming from?"

It is interesting to note that most of our Marist Brother inquirers are coming from the Internet. Some men learn about us either through an online service called vocationmatch.com sponsored by *Vision* Magazine or another publication, *Guide to Religious Ministries*. We have ads in both.

Young men from our high schools who express interest in our vocation will now either move right into **Accompaniment** or the Marist **Young Adult Program**. Our **Accompaniment** stage is designed for the collegeage man as well as for those who are not familiar with the Marist Brothers. Men who are ready to explore our vocation more seriously move right into **Discernment**.

The vast majority of men in formation today in the USA are in their mid to late 20s and 30s. A man interested in exploring Marist religious life moves through a series of stages, increasing his knowledge and experiences of personal prayer, God's call, Marist life, and the discernment process.

Accompaniment

This phase of our vocation program invites a man between the ages of 18 and 40 to initially examine his understanding of a Marist religious vocation. Accompanied regularly by a Marist Brother through personal and electronic means, he learns how the discernment process can be part of his life. Accompaniment includes community, ministry, and retreat experiences with the Marist Brothers. Accompaniment can last for a few years, until the young man is invited to move into **Discernment**.

Discernment

A man who feels called by God to Marist religious life would be eligible to begin **Discernment**. This phase of our vocation program is primarily for the college graduate who is ready to process his call. A flexible yet focused plan of discernment is established, which includes community, ministry, and retreat opportunities with the Marist Brothers.

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Brian Poulin, Our New Pre-Novice



Brian Poulin has applied and been accepted to the Initial Formation Program of the Marist Brothers for September 2008.

Brian Poulin isn't the stereotypical pre-novice. He grew up in Seattle, Washington with his Catholic dad and non-Catholic mom. He attended pub-

lic grade school and Catholic high school, irregularly attending Mass as a child. Brian studied philosophy at Kenyon College, a small liberal arts school in Ohio, and went on to live and work in China for five years after graduation. While his story is unique, many of us can relate to it in one way or another.

Dear members of our Marist Family,

This fall the superior general of the Marist Brothers, Brother Sean Sammon, F.M.S., issued a circular letter formally convoking the XXI General Chapter of the Marist Brothers that will open in September, 2009. In his letter, Brother Sean asserted that today the Marist Brothers stand in the doorway of a new chapter in the history of Marist life and mission. He continued that our founder, Saint Marcellin Champagnat, would ". . . challenge his brothers to re-imagine consecrated life for our day and age, a consecrated life that included the old-fashioned virtues of sacrifice, dedication, and self-transcendence above putting our needs first and settling for comfort and complacency." The work and deliberations of the Brothers who will gather in Rome next fall will determine the direction of the Brothers throughout the world, and I encourage each of you to keep the success of our General Chapter in your prayers.

Part of this newsletter focuses on the theme of vocations and the re-opening of our Marist novitiate in Esopus, New York. Hopefully the articles have introduced our new pre-postulant, Brian Poulin, to you and also inspired you to continue your prayers for good vocations and, perhaps, to encourage a young man you know to consider a life as a Marist Brother.

The 2008–2009 school year began with the launching of the fiftieth anniversary celebrations at Roselle Catholic High School in Roselle, New Jersey and at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami. Part of the initial celebrations at Roselle Catholic included the dedication of the school chapel to St. Marcellin Champagnat and the blessing of a wonderful statue of St. Marcellin on the wall behind the altar. Archbishop John Favalora of Miami was the principal celebrant of the fiftieth anniversary Liturgy at Columbus. After the Liturgy, the archbishop blessed the new Mas Technology Center, a place that will significantly enhance the educational program for the over 1,400 Columbus students. We are grateful and blessed that the Lord continues to bless our Marist mission.

I am also delighted to announce that His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI has bestowed the Papal Cross Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice upon Brother Kevin Handibode, the president of Christopher Columbus High School. This pontifical honor is a recognition at the highest level of the Church of Brother Kevin's outstanding witness to the Catholic faith. We congratulate Brother Kevin on this honor, which is a blessing on him and our entire Marist Family.

As we enter the season of Advent let us pray that the Lord will continue to bless us and our mission to the young people who need us the most.

Jeannette Victoria, teacher, Monsignor Edward Pace High School, Miami, Florida



For as long as I can remember. I wanted to be a teacher or do some other job where I would work with children. In high

school, after assisting a great number of classmates with their math, I knew that was the subject that I wanted to teach. To me, teaching is not only the subject matter, but the opportunity to share my life and experiences with my students. As being Catholic is an important part of my life, I could not imagine teaching somewhere where I would not be able to share that part of my life. So I wanted to teach at a Catholic school, and to me there is no better Catholic school than Pace.

Shortly after graduation, I applied to teach. At this point the Marist Brothers had returned to our community. There always was a very welcoming environment with a strong sense of family at Pace. With the Marist Brothers, that sense of family was even stronger. There was something about the Brothers that made everyone who entered the campus feel welcome. The Brothers I came in contact with were truly amazing. They personified what it meant to be Marist. The presence of the Brothers made Pace a much better place.

During my first year of teaching the two people who showed me what it meant to be Marist were Br. George DiCarluccio and Mrs. Ana Garcia. Br. George had this presence that lit up any room the moment he entered. He had a way of communicating with the students that was inspiring. You could see by the way he talked with the students that he truly loved each and every one of them.

principal when I started. She was always available to assist myself and the other first-year teachers. She had this welcoming sense about her that

The pillars of my Marist faith are Marcellin's vision, Mary's example of standing with the poor in suffering, prayer, service, and my Marist community.


Finally, my dream is that the Marist vision of life and community

Marist Youth Leadership Confe

During Memorial Day weekend, 250 students from thirteen Marist schools gathered at the Marist Brothers Retreat House in Esopus, New York for the 2008 Marist Youth Leadership Conference.

Students looked at the lives of Jesus and St. Marcellin Champagnat from the perspective of servant leadership. As the students learned about servant leadership, they also learned about their own leadership strengths and abilities through discussion and related activities.

Students from Collège Laval (Canada), École Secondaire Marcellin Champagnat (Canada), Central Catholic High School (Lawrence, MA), Archbishop Molloy High School (Briarwood, NY), St. Agnes Boys' High School (New York City), Mt. St. Michael Academy (Bronx, NY), Marist High School (Bayonne, NJ), Roselle Catholic High School (Roselle, NJ), Christopher Columbus High School (Miami, FL), St. Brendan High School (Miami, FL), Monsignor Edward Pace High School (Miami, FL), St. Joseph Academy (Brownsville, TX), and Cervantes Costa Rica (Mexico), gathered at the Marist Brothers Retreat House.

One of the highlights of this gathering was the presence of Marist students from Canada and Mexico. A strong sense of North American Marist identity is being developed, as well as a great awareness of the Marist world.

The presentations focused on the differences between secular leadership and Christian leadership. The hallmark of Christian leadership, as the students learned, is service. The lives of Jesus and St. Marcellin provide many examples of how to be a leader and a servant at the same time. Students were able to make practical application of the leadership qualities of Jesus and St. Marcellin to their own lives.

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A change occurred for Brian while he was working in China, and he began to feel a strong pull toward the Catholic Church. He chose to initiate the process of receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation and, through that process, became intrigued by the possibility of living a religious life.

After some casual research, Brian realized that the life of a Brother might be a fit for him. Brian describes getting into bed one night, thinking about his future and all of the research he had done. Unable to sleep, he suddenly had a powerful thought that the Marist Brothers were a group he should seriously consider. They hadn't been part of his research, but a memory of his grandfather, who used to share anecdotes about the Marist Brothers, came to mind. Energized by what he felt was a strong emotional presence of his grandfather, Brian quickly looked for the Marist Brothers online. He liked the content and tone of the website (www.maristbr.com), and he especially liked the Brothers' emphasis on education, especially for those most in need. That night, Brian sent an email to the Marist Brothers vocations director, Brother Mike Sheerin, as well as his parents, to share his powerful experience.

Those phone calls began Brian's discernment process with Br. Mike Sheerin. Today, several months since that critical evening, Brian is back in the United States and continuing his discernment. He feels a strong affiliation with the poor, and looks forward to helping people overcome whatever obstacles they face. Brian's goal for



In Memoriam



Brother Michael Mullin

A beloved Brother and valued educator passed away on Wednesday, April 30, 2008. Born in Brooklyn, Michael Mullin received the habit of a Marist Brother in August 1959 and made his final profession in July 1965. He received his B.A.

degree in Latin from Marist College, Poughkeepsie.

Br. Michael obtained an M.A. degree in classics from Hunter College in New York, an M.A. in theology from Notre Dame University, an M.S. degree in counseling from Saint John's University, and his doctorate in school administration from Seton Hall University.

From 1975 to 1981, Br. Mike served as the vocational director for the Marist Brothers in Esopus, N.Y. "He was very professional

and extremely educated," said Br. Kevin O'Neill, who worked with him as vice principal at Marist High School, Bayonne, in 1981.

Br. Mike taught and was an administrator in Florida, New Jersey, and New York. He also served as principal of Our Lady in Lourdes High School, Poughkeepsie. Most recently, he was a teacher at John S. Burke Catholic High School in Goshen, NY. "He was very hardworking and determined to make the schools the best they could be," recalls Br. Kevin. "He wanted the best for his faculty and students."

Over the years as teacher, counselor, vocation director, administrator, or friend, Br. Mike touched the lives of many in the gentle way that he lived, ministered, and served. Br. Mike was greatly loved and will truly be missed.

On September 9 a gentle man died a gentle death. Br. Luke Driscoll was born to Elizabeth and Patrick Driscoll in the Bronx on September 30, 1917 and passed away quietly on the evening of September 9, 2008 at our Champagnat Hall community at

Mount St. Michael Academy in the Bronx. Br. Luke was 91 years old, and lived as a Marist Brother for 75 of those years.

There are Brothers who possess a special charism. It's hard to describe that quality in a person, but once you've seen it you know it. J. P. Luke ("just plain" Luke—he didn't have the customary second religious name) was one of those Brothers. J. P. Luke was magnetic. He had "cousins" galore and admirers aplenty. His gentle being and his inclusive, smiling glance made you feel like you were part of something; like you were someone special. It's no wonder he was so popular with his family, students, and fellow Brothers.

As Br. Luke moved through his years as a Marist he served his students as teacher, principal, and counselor, the Marist Brothers as spiritual director, and his hospital patients as chaplain in New York, Texas, Massachusetts, Georgia, Illinois, West Virginia, Switzerland, Africa, and Italy before he retired to the Champagnat Hall Community in his "home town" of the Bronx, New York.

Brother was buried in the Marist Brothers cemetery in Esopus, NY on September 13, where he continues to warmly welcome all who come to visit. May he rest in peace.
