A Legacy to Education:

Marcellin PROGRAM



On February 28, 2010, Br. Vito Aresto, FMS, longtime teacher and guidance counselor at Marist High School in Chicago, Illinois, went home to God after a two-year battle with esophageal cancer; he was 62 years old. During those two years Br. Vito chose to

fight his disease with the most aggressive treatments available to maximize what time he had left on this earth. His biggest frustration with the cancer was that he felt he still had so much left to do.

Among the many accomplishments Br. Vito achieved in his short life, the Marcellin Program for individualized learning will be remembered as his legacy to Marist education. St. Marcellin Champagnat, founder of the Marist Brothers, himself struggled with his schooling and later realized that the key to success was to recognize the individual learning styles of students and build

academic programs to support their strengths and gifts. In this spirit, Br. Vito created the Marcellin Program.

The brainchild of Br. Vito, the Marcellin Program allows for tailored instruction with specialized teachers in smaller classes. The program permits teachers to gain a real knowledge of their students in order to individualize the learning experience in a non-traditional classroom setting. Teachers are aware of student needs and meet with students to discuss their work, address problem areas, and provide support. As students grow within the program, they come to recognize their academic strengths and weaknesses and become advocates for themselves, seeking help in areas of need while mastering other areas.

Peer leaders are also an important part of what makes the Marcellin Program successful. Peer leaders are seniors who work as aids to each of the teachers within the Marcellin Program.

Although Br. Vito designed the Marcellin Program to be a four-year sequence of college preparatory courses, the opportunity is available for students to take classes

with any other program.

Mr. Pat Hennessy, a close friend and colleague of Br. Vito's recalls,

Mrs. Elena M. Alvarez, Christopher Columbus High School, Miami, Florida



I was born in San Juan, Puerto Rico, went to Trinity College in Washington, DC, returned to Puerto Rico, and

in a dozen years married and had identical twin boys, Manuel and Francisco. In December of 1998 my husband accepted a job offer in Florida and, for the good of our family, we moved to Miami in May of 1999. It was not an easy transition, but apparently God had plans for me.

During my college years I was very involved in campus ministry, was very active in volunteer services, was chosen as a resident assistant, and also became a teacher assistant. In 1999 I found that my new job in Miami at Christopher Columbus High School gave me an opportunity

to serve others in a different environment. The involvement with students is truly a wonderful and special responsibility. I have always liked the golden rule of Marcellin Champagnat: "To educate children first you must love them, and love them equally." In the teaching field, besides Marcellin, my other two models are Mary, who is the perfect model of a Marist educator, and my mother, who has been a teacher since she left Cuba in 1962.

One of the things that I enjoy about Marcellin's life is that someone gave him a chance to be good—which became part of his philosophy of education, "Tell your children that Jesus and Mary love them all very much: those who are good because they resemble Jesus Christ, who is infinitely good; those who are not yet good because they will become

so." I don't know what my destiny will be, but one thing I know I should do—motivate other educators to follow as disciples of Marcellin. In this world of turmoil, we have to believe in our mission to lead young people to life-giving

Mr. Tony DelGiudice, Mount St. Michael Academy, Bronx, New York



Almost 30 years ago, I began my teaching career at Mount St. Michael Academy. Little did I know then

that in 2010 I would still be there, very involved with the Marist Brothers and their ministry.

When I first heard of Marcellin Champagnat, he was still "Blessed," and we said simple prayers to him. It was not until well into my career at Mount that I learned more about this man and his mission. What he and many of the Brothers have taught me for almost three decades is to do good quietly, let the actions speak for themselves, and not look for anything in return.

My work at Mount St. Michael these past three decades has opened up a new world to me. When I participated in the first Sharing Our Call Program, in December 1998, I learned that teaching is more than just a job or profession, it is a vocation. students who have re-instilled in
me lessons from my parents so
many years ago.

Donor Profile: Amy and Nick Limongelli



My relationship with the Marist Brothers began on September 1, 1953, as a young man starting at St. Agnes High School in New York City. The Marist Brothers promised "Mama" Limongelli that they would keep her son working at a local business in the busy New York area that employed their students. At that time of my life, my family was unable to afford the \$15 a month tuition. The Marist Brothers kept their promise by having me work after school. By doing so, I could afford the tuition

and still be able to bring home some funds to help support the family. The Marist Brothers were always there to counsel and support me because my father was working night shifts due to his pay differential.

I graduated from St. Agnes in June 1957 and started my business career in banking. The bank paid my college tuition for the next seven years, and I was able to graduate from Baruch College with a degree in finance and marketing in 1964. My career started in banking, then in finance and eventually insurance.

Using the knowledge I gained from these experiences, I started my own organization on October 1, 1973. The firm specializes in wealth accumulation for families

in new startup corporations. The other areas the firm specializes in are financial consultation, buy/sell business agreements, retirement planning, estate and educational planning, and charitable giving.

My career has grown beyond my expectations, and I am proud that my children, Joseph, John, and Anne, have all followed me in my business. My wife of 49 years, Amy, has also been a part of my business. Together, we both graduated from Adelphi University with a "Certified Financial Planning" designation.

My career has been great, like the years I spent with the Marist Brothers at St. Agnes. My brother, Joseph, six years younger than me, is also a St. Agnes graduate. As youngsters, my children also experienced the kindness of the Marist Brothers by attending summer camp at Camp Marist in Center Ossipee, New Hampshire.


Because of the inspiration, spiritual support, and kindness of the Marist Brothers, the Limongelli family decided to financially support the Marist Brothers. We are concerned about the Marist Brothers, their future, and especially the needs of the elderly and disabled Brothers. Another concern we have is the decline in financial support to the Brothers as their current donors age. While generous during their life, when these supporters pass away, their donations are lost forever. The Limongelli family has set up a program so that a gift to the Marist Brothers will continue forever. You can too.

A Lasting Legacy

- a) Make a gift that buys a life insurance contract with the Marist Brothers as sole beneficiaries. This premium is tax-deductible to the donor immediately.
- b) The Marist Brothers receive the proceeds of the insurance contract tax-free.
- This concept uses pennies to buy dollars and guarantees that the gift the donor was giving will continue forever for the Marist Brothers.

Example: If the donor annually gives a \$20,000 gift, we use this gift to purchase a \$1 million dollar life insurance contract. This contract will offer a death benefit payable to the Marist Brothers and will also produce cash values in dividends for the Marist Brothers. These funds are available to the Brothers at any time they are needed.

e) Upon the death of the donor, these funds become available to the Marist Brothers to invest, set up an annuity at 5% to produce a \$50,000 income for life, and preserve the \$1,000,000 at all times. Gift giving using life insurance will mean the Marist Brothers will have continuous income for generations, so the Marist order can continue to bring solid Christian education and guidance to future generations.

At the same time, he never lost sight of Marcellin Champagnat, who struggled in school himself, and the fact that he succeeded. Vito was a voice that people listened to."

Br. Vito's Marcellin Program is but one of the premier programs inaugurated at our Marist schools across the United States which offers college preparatory classes for students with unique learning needs.








Christopher Columbus Alumnus Awarded Medal of Freedom

Dr. Pedro Jose Greer, alumnus and former Director at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, Florida, received the Medal of Freedom on August 11, 2009. President Obama awarded the nation's highest civilian honor to sixteen "agents of change," citing their accomplishments as examples of the heights a person can reach and the difference they can make in the lives of others. The president said, "What unites them is a belief that our lives are what we make of them ... and that the truest test of a person's life is what we do for one another."

Dr. Greer is currently the assistant dean of academic affairs at Florida International University School of Medicine and the founder of the Camillus Health Concern, which treats thousands of homeless patients each year.

Other recipients of the Medal of Freedom included physicist Dr. Stephen Hawking, actor Sidney Poitier, former Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, retired archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa, and Sen. Brother Vito Aresto was born in 1947
in the Bronx, New York, and made his
profession as a Marist Brother in 1966.
He obtained his bachelor's degree in
1970, a master's in theology from

St. Xavier University in Chicago in 1974, his MS in Education from Chicago State University in 1990, and his Doctorate in Pastoral Counseling in 1994.

Following his years of Provincial service as Director of Formation, Provincial Councilor, and then as Vice Provincial, Br. Vito returned to his work as teacher and counselor at Marist High School in Chicago, always seeing his work as a calling. Br. Vito died of esophageal cancer, at home, February 28, 2010.
