They're all talking about the Marist Youth Gathering 2014 that took place at Mount St. Mary College, Newburgh, New York, over Memorial Day weekend. The Marist Youth Gathering is a biennial event. Over 230 youth, school staff and college-age young adults attended this four-day youth festival and leadership-building conference. They

came from our Marist schools in Texas, IIlinois, Massachusetts, Florida, New York, New Jersey, Canada and Mexico. The program was organized by the Marist Brothers' Office of Evangelization (Province of the USA).

Young people and adults who participated in the Marist Youth Gathering developed a wider understanding of their Marist identity, charism and mission which goes beyond their immediate school identity. The activities which made up the program— talks and workshop presentations, interactive games and initiatives, discussion and reflection groups, prayer and worship experiences, and social and community building events-were meant to transmit a sense of Marist heritage, family spirit and spirituality, while inspiring, motivating, and building confidence in youth who want to take up leadership roles in their schools and in the local Church. This year's theme was "To Jesus Through Mary."

Br. Tony Leon, co-director of the secretariat for "Brothers Today" in Rome, Italy, was the conference's main presenter. He offered

Dear Members of the Marist Family,

The great font of cyber information, Wikipedia, defines Advent as "a season observed in many Western Christian churches as a 'time of expectant waiting and preparation' for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas. The term is an anglicized version of the Latin word adventus, meaning 'coming." In our secularized world, decorations in department stores and the nonstop Christmas music on numerous radio stations mark the "coming" of this joy-filled season. three presentations focusing on the stories of St. Marcellin Champagnat: first, how the stories of each youth in attendance form the Marist story today; second, a Marial spirituality for young people today; and finally, how each is responsible to be Marist today. Te Deum Ministries offered a multimedia, multidimensional program called "Array of Hope." It included Christian rock and rap music, witness presentations, prayer and worship experiences, and a reflective visual presentation on the life of St. Marcellin Champagnat. As part of the program, Luis Ramos, a Marist Young Adult and leader of the Province's Marist Young Adult Advisory Committee, offered a personal witness on how his commitment to Christ has grown through his involvement in Marist Youth Ministry.

Workshop presentations included, among others, a session on the International Mission Assembly which was held in Nairobi, Kenya; use of the labyrinth and mandala as tools of prayer for young people; ways of being Marist; and how adventure games and challenges can build family spirit. One youth group offered a workshop on how they include teachers, school administrators, families and friends in their Marist youth program. A skillsbased, formation-focused workshop was held for adult youth ministers on effective ways of talking and interacting with youth.



Student groups from different schools planned morning and evening prayers. Eighteen university-age young adults participated in the conference, assisting as group

leaders. Mr. Larry Kupferman, campus minister from St. Mary High School, Manhasset, New York was the conference's music minister and Mr. Brian Klimas, a math teacher at Archbishop Molly High School, Briarwood, New York was emcee. Fr. Richard LaMorte, chaplain at Marist College, Poughkeepsie, New York, and an affiliate of the Province, led the Sunday evening liturgy. Following the Mass, participants enjoyed an outdoor BBQ and a dance. The evening ended with a Taize prayer experience led by Br. Dan O'Riordan, FMS, a member of the Province's vocation team.

The conference closed on Memorial Day with a solidarity event which remembered our Marist Brothers and lay colleagues now suffering in Aleppo, Syria.

Esopus Corner

he Marist Brothers' Center at Esopus is devoted to the work of Christian evangelization. Here the presence of God is discovered in a new way by young people and adults alike (Vision Statement). Each year over 4,000 young people come through our doors to participate in retreats, encounters and days of reflection. We have the privilege to witness God's grace in action as God is experienced in their encounters with nature, other people and the solitude of one's own heart. God's presence is what makes this space sacred. In our popular U.S. Marist tradition, Esopus is "holy ground."



In Memoriam



Br. Anthony Tazzetti, FMS

Br. Anthony lazzetti, FMS, entered the Marist Brothers' Novitiate in Tyngsborough, Massachusetts,

in 1961 and was a Marist Brother for 52 years. He taught and served as assistant principal or principal at eight primary and secondary schools around the country before retiring to Champagnat Hall in the Bronx, New York. Br. Anthony passed away on June 1.

Brother Anthony had a long and diverse career as an educator. After graduating with his B.A. in chemistry from Marist College, Poughkeepsie, New York, he went on to serve as a teacher and, later, a school administrator at Marist schools around the country. He also continued his own education, earning his master of science in natural science from Seattle University, a certificate of advanced study from the University of Oregon and a master of science in administration from the University of Notre Dame. In 1992, he earned a doctorate in education from the University of San Francisco. Br. Anthony was a former member of the Marist College Board of Trustees and served on the Academic Affairs, Student Life and Technology committees at Marist College.



Br. Francis Bernard Ryan, FMS

Br. Francis Bernard Ryan, FMS, died on June 5 at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx, New York, after 65 years as a Marist Brother. After completing his religious and academic studies, Br. Francis spent the next 47 years ministering at St. Ann's Academy, Mount St. Michael Academy and Rice High School in the Archdiocese of New York; Archbishop Molloy High School in the Diocese of Brooklyn, New York; St. Mary's High School in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, New York; St. Joseph Academy in the Diocese of Brownsville, Texas; and Marist High School in the Archdiocese of Newark, New Jersey.

Br. Francis retired to the Marist Brothers' residence at Champagnat Hall in 2000. He was buried in the Marist Brothers' Cemetery in Esopus, New York.



Br John Peter Bantz, FMS

Br. John Bantz, FMS, began and ended his career at Mount St. Michael Academy in the Bronx, New York,

first as a fledgling freshman in 1952 and finally as its president starting in 1997.

As a young Marist Brother he began his teaching at St. Joseph School in Trumbull, Connecticut, then continued at Cardinal Hayes High School in the Bronx, New York. He also taught at Luke M. Powers High School in Flint, Michigan, and at Bishop Carroll High School in Ebensberg, Pennsylvania. He took on administrative duties at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, Florida, and St. Agnes Boys High School in New York City. Br. John came back to Mount St. Michael Academy as President from 1997 - 2006, after which he served the Mount community by working in the Development Office until his death.

Br. John died on September 6 at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx at the age of 76 and after 55 years as a Marist Brother.
