# The Superior General Visited the USA Provincial Chapter Meeting



he 2018 USA Provincial Chapter meeting took place from March 22-25. Brothers from around the country had previously been voted as delegates to participate in the Chapter meeting. This year's meeting is the first in the USA Province's history at which Marist laity were invited to be full participants in the entire Chapter weekend. In total, 43 Brother delegates and lay guests joined together to discuss the future of the Marist charism in the United States.

Attendees were especially excited for the presence of Br. Ernesto Sanchez-Barba, who was elected the new Superior General of the Marist Institute at the 22nd General Chapter meeting in Rionegro, Colombia, last fall.

In his address to Chapter delegates, Br. Ernesto spoke of "letting go of past dreams to allow new dreams to be formed." He discussed with the Brothers the five calls which came out of the General Chapter meeting:

- To respond boldly to emerging needs
- To be a global, charismatic family, a beacon of hope in this turbulent world
- To be the face and hands of your tender mercy
- To be inspired by our creativity to be bridge-builders
- To journey with children and young people living on the margins of life



At the USA Provincial Chapter meeting, Br. Ernesto reiterated the message from the General

Chapter meeting that what Brothers today need to focus on is not who to be, but what to do, because the future can only be changed if action is taken.

# ESOPUS CORNER





uring the General Chapter meeting in Rionegro, Colombia last fall, the delegate Brothers elected the new Superior General and the members of his General Council. It is these leaders of the institute who, during the next eight years, will put into practice the institute's appeal: "Journeying together as a Global Family."

The United States Province's former Provincial Br. Ben Consigli was elected to be one of the new General Councilors. His first experience with the Marist Brothers was when he attended Archbishop Molloy High School in Queens, New York, where the Brothers impressed him as being extraordinary teachers. They helped ignite a spark in him to want to be a teacher and work directly with young people. In college he majored in American history and minored in philosophy while also helping out his alma mater's student retreat program. His postgraduate degrees are in non-western history and educational leadership/administration.

Throughout his years as a Brother, he has ministered in Marist schools in the states of New York, New Jersey, Texas, and Florida. Br. Ben has also worked for the past 30 years with deaf children at the Mid-Hudson Valley Summer Camp in Esopus, New York.

#### How was your experience of your election?

I must admit that I was overwhelmed by my election to the General Council. I felt a lot of mixed emotions. I felt enormous support from the Brothers at the Chapter, and their confidence in me helped sustain me over the initial days after the election. While I experienced a sense of excitement and anticipation at the task facing us as a new Council, I also became more acutely aware of my own limitations—my own doubts about my abilities to assist the institute in setting a path for the future of Marist life and mission over the next eight years. What has been clear is God's urgings and revelations that I am not alone, that God is with me and my Brothers of the General Council as we move forward. This has given me much peace and confidence, even as I try to learn another language!

#### How is your new life in the General House so far?

Like all transitions, my transition from the United States to the General House in Rome has had its ups and downs. Leaving my community, my ministry, and my students in Florida was hard, but at the same time I was welcomed warmly by the Brothers and lay men and women here at the General House. Over time I am becoming more comfortable with the rhythm of life here and learning how to navigate my life in Rome. Having the support and good humor of the General Council community has made the transition more authentic, and in some ways, fun!

# Considering the reflection of the General Chapter, what do you think should be the Council's line(s) of action for the next eight years?

As a Council we have begun reflecting on what the calls of the General Chapter are asking us "to be" and "to do" as a leadership team. While we are just beginning our mandate, I do believe that for the vitality of our Marist life and mission we are called to be an interdependent global family which reflects God's mercy and love. Anything that we can do to foster or nurture that will assist us as we try to make real a "New LaValla" for today.



r. Luis Ramos entered the novitiate of the Marist Brothers, located on the campus of Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York, last August.

## IN MEMORIAM

"Gus" Landry, FMS,
a member of the
Marist Brothers
of the Schools for
67 years, died on

October 24th, 2017, at De LaSalle Hall in Lincroft, New Jersey. He was 89 years old.

Prior to entering the Marist Brothers, Br. Gus served as a first class fireman in the U.S. Navy. He became a Postulant with the Marist Brothers in 1949 and professed first vows in 1951 before working on the original construction of Marist College in upstate New York. From 1953-56 he studied at the Marist College Scholasticate and earned a bachelor of arts degree.

Br. Gus professed perpetual vows in 1956 and taught at various schools in New York for 10 years. In 1966, he professed the Vow of Stability and the following year attended the second Novitiate program. From 1968-2003 Br. Gus worked in various roles at the Marist Brothers International School in Kobe, Japan, serving as a director, teacher, and board chairperson. In 1996, Marist College honored Br. Gus with an honorary doctorate degree for his time spent building the original buildings of the college.

Br. Gus was retired and lived at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx prior to his death.

Schools for 64 years, died on October 27, 2017, at his home in Bayonne, New Jersey. He was 82 years old.

Br. Kevin was born in Brooklyn, New York. He spent most of his childhood

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living in Lawrence, Massachusetts, where he attended Central Catholic High School before entering the Marist Juniorate in Esopus, New York, in 1950. He became a Postulant with the Marist Brothers in 1952, entered the Marist Brothers Novitiate at Tyngsboro, Massachusetts, in 1953, and professed first vows in 1954. After completing his religious and academic studies at Marist College, Br. Kevin served as a missionary

Brother in the Philippines.

He returned to Marist High School in Bayonne, New Jersey, as a teacher in 1976 and soon became an assistant principal until 1985. He served as principal of Roselle Catholic High School from 1986-89 before returning to the Philippines from 1989-92. After arriving back in the U.S., he served various roles in Marist schools in Texas and New Jersey before his role as treasurer for the USA Province (2000-09).

After retiring in 2009, Br. Kevin continued to live in Bayonne and serve on the Marist High School Board.

October 30, 2017 Br. Thomas Delaney, FMS, a member of the Marist Brothers of

the Schools for 62 years, died on October 30th, 2017, at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx, New York. He was 82 years old.

He attended Mount Saint Michael Academy before becoming a Postulant with the Marist Brothers in 1954. He entered the Marist Brothers Novitiate in Tyngsboro, Massachusetts, in 1955 and professed first vows in 1956. After completing his religious and academic studies at Marist College, he began his ministry serving as a teacher at Marist High School in Bayonne, New Jersey, in 1959. He professed perpetual vows in 1961.

From 1962-75 Br. Thomas was a teacher in New York and New Jersey, then served as an administrator at schools in New York, New Jersey, and Texas. He also taught for 16 summers in Dublin, Ireland, at the Marist Brothers International Language School.

After retiring, Br. Thomas lived in various communities in New York and Florida before moving to Champagnat Hall in the Bronx, where he was living from 2012 until his death.




Brother Luke Reddington

February 2, 2018 Br. Luke Reddington, FMS, a member of the Marist Brothers

of the Schools for 67 years, died on February 2, 2018 at Lawrence Hospital in Bronxville, New York. He was 83 years old.

Br. Luke attended the Marist Brothers
Juniorate from 1949-50 before
becoming a Postulant in 1950 and
entering the Novitiate in Tyngsboro,
Massachusetts, in 1951. He professed
first vows in 1952. After completing his
religious and academic studies at Marist
College, he began teaching in New York
before moving to Florida to teach from
1966-70. He also served for many years
as a school administrator at various
schools in New York and New Jersey. Br.
Luke served as Provincial from 1974-77
and as master of novices from 1988-90.

Br. Luke professed his final vows in 1957 and earned a Masters degree in English from St. John's University in 1961. He retired in 2012 to the Marist Brothers community at Champagnat Hall in the Bronx.



Brother Vinsent Moriarty February 25, 2018

February 25, 2018 Br. Vincent Moriarty, FMS, a member of the

Marist Brothers of the Schools for 60 years, died on February 25, 2018. He was 80 years old.

Br. Vincent grew up in Westfield, Massachusetts. He entered the Marist Brothers Novitiate in August 1955, took the habit in 1956, and made his first vows in 1957. He graduated from Marist College and in 1960 and pronounced his final yows in 1962.

He began his professional career at Mount Saint Michael Academy in the Bronx, New York, where he taught history and served as dean of discipline in the late 1960's. He then moved on to Marist College for four years and was director of college students waiting to enter the Novitiate. While at Marist College, he pronounced his Vow of Stability. Br. Vincent's next assignments were at schools in New York City, where he became one of the alternate delegates to the UN for the Movement for a Better World-Protection of Children.

Br. Vincent spent many years in Suma-ku, Kobe, Japan, where he became the principal of the Marist Brothers International School. After the "Great Hansin" Earthquake in January 2005 Br. Vincent had to return to New York City for open heart surgery and never returned to Japan. After taking a sabbatical year, he taught in New York for one year before moving to Florida to work in administration.

Br. Vincent retired in 2015 and spent his final years doing volunteer work in campus ministry at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, Florida. He described his life as "a rather interesting 60-year adventure with the Lord."
