We Have A New Look!

In the process of designing a new logo for the Marist Brothers Province of the United States, the team of Brothers working on the project learned two very important things about logo design.

The first important learning was that no logo could contain or should contain all of the concepts or themes that we might associate with the Marist Brothers. For instance, "All to Jesus through Mary," "reading the signs of the times," "love them all equally" are difficult concepts to present in a single logo.

familiar Marist concepts and themes express who we are.

As a result, the new logo is very simple: an M with a background of colors suggesting stained glass.

A second version of that logo incorporates the faces of three of our Brothers: Rene Roy, Leo Shea, and Todd Patenaude. This logo is featured prominently in

In addition to the print material and DVD, vocation posters and ads are being designed, and they feature Brothers Roy George, Peter Guadalupe, Todd Patenaude, and Rene Roy.

The second important learning was that the logo should be designed for the general public as an *introduction* to the Marist Brothers. The general public is not familiar with the Marist concepts and themes that are so ingrained in us. The new logo is an introduction or doorway to the Marist Brothers. Dear Members of the Marist Family,

In my letter to you this past Advent I asked for your help in the Marist Brothers' effort to create a "culture of vocations" that would encourage young men to consider committing to life as a Brother. I wrote, "... I want to ask you to encourage a young man who you think might have a vocation to consider a call to the Marist Brothers. History tells us that young men who have joined religious life have done so because they were personally invited and encouraged to respond to God's call. We need you to work with us so that many young men will walk in Marcellin's path."

Since then, our Vocation Team has launched a Communications Program entitled, "Real Brothers...Real Stories...A Real Difference." Through the use of a DVD and an accompanying booklet several Marist Brothers speak about the experiences that inspired them to become Brothers and situations that ultimately shaped their lives. Their stories are a powerful testament to faith, fellowship, and what happens when a Marist Brother makes a lifelong commitment to transforming the lives and situations of young people and challenging them to live their fullest potential in Christ.

I am very hopeful about the future of the Marist Brothers. Not too long ago, I listened to a radio interview with Neil Sedaka on NPR. The interviewer wanted to know why the singer/songwriter—with a number one hit under his belt every decade since the 1960's—was still writing songs. Mr. Sedaka's answer was simple and to the point. "The best one hasn't been written yet," he responded. I too believe that the best song for the life of the Marist Brothers remains unwritten.

In reading our Marist stories, I'm amazed and humbled by the depth of commitment to our mission and the commitment and love for the people we serve. I also learned new things about Brothers I've known for decades. When we tell our stories, it not only reminds us why we became Marist Brothers, but also, hopefully, will inspire others to explore this path.

One of the biggest challenges for us today is to honor the past, deal with the present, and look with confidence to the future. My hope and dream is that every Marist Brother, the lay people like yourself with whom we work, and the people we serve, will really believe as I do, that our best song hasn't been written yet.

I cannot testify as to my experience as a lay Marist without discussing the beauty of St. Agnes Boys High School and how working at St. Agnes has made palpable to me the vision of Marcellin Champagnat. Every day, I am inspired to live out the dream of Champagnat by my students, by the Marist Brothers and by the colleagues whom I consider to be my closest friends.

When I first came to St. Agnes at twenty-one, I was at once invited into the Marist community through a genuine, tangible love and support that I didn't know would or could exist in my professional life. I now realize that my experience as a teacher could have been very different had I not been open to this sense of community that I didn't even know I craved. The encouragement by the Marist Brothers and by the school, especially by Brother Al Rivera and by Mr. Robert Conte who personally supported and mentored me during that trying first year of teaching, got me quickly and wholeheartedly involved in the spiritual life of St. Agnes and of the Marists. It was through this immersion in the spiritual life of the


school and of the Marist community that I was able to begin to know Marcellin Champagnat, and to begin to realize my own purpose as a Marist teacher within only weeks of becoming one.

I always laugh at the career advice I have too frequently been given by those who haven't shared my experience or have not thought to consider what my experience has meant to me: to get out of the field of Catholic education as soon as possible and to avoid the dangers of becoming too emotionally involved in work. It is impossible and foolish for me to separate myself from what I do, because my work as a Marist teacher is the realest expression of who I am.

A vocation, much like Marcellin's way of educating, is personal, rooted in real life, and practical. God calls us to meet the needs of the here and now, but the call starts with a friend-ship. In this sense, my vocation as a lay Marist began and is sustained as much by my friendship with the



Brothers as it is tied in and enriched by my life as a husband and a father.

I really first heard about the work of the Brothers from family elders who to this day cherish their 'Marista' years in Cuba as life-defining moments.

Piqued by curiosity and wanting to know more about the life of this man who had so stirred people across continents, I ventured into Brother Jean Baptist's biography of Father Champagnat. His life impelled me to read and reflect on other documents of the Marist Brothers. Yet again, it is really because of the testimony and friendship with the Brothers that I am better able to define Marcellin's charism and my role as a Marist educator.

Marcellin's translation of the Gospel into a life dedicated to loving young people through education was certainly as revolutionary with the youth of his day in rural France as it is now for me here in Miami, Florida. The challenge today may seem a bit more complex, but the dream of educating in the Gospel – acknowledging and respecting the wholeness of the human person and sharing a way of life rooted in the person of Jesus Christ – is very much a needed reality to counter our broken homes and materialistic, self-serving social mores. Insofar as I attempt to live Marcellin's zeal for making education a genuine act of love, I believe that I am Marist.

The "Mission Ad Gentes" Project

n December 2005, Br. Sean Sammon, Superior General, invited all Marist Brothers throughout the world to consider his invitation to be part of a "Mission Ad Gentes" effort to Asia. In doing so, Br. Sean reminded the Brothers that "we are missionary by nature." St. Marcellin Champagnat, founder of the Marist Brothers longed to go to the missions of the Pacific, but ill-health and administrative needs forced him to stay in France.

The plan, as Br. Sean explained it, would send 150 or more Brothers over the next four years to new works throughout the

countries of Asia. In choosing Asia, Br. Sean reminded

and Statutes tell us that we should have a particular concern for countries which have not been evangelized and for the young Churches. The late Pope John Paul II hoped that "in the Third Christian Millennium a great harvest of faith will be reaped in this vast

and vital continent of Asia."

While Asia is home to approximately twothirds of the world's population, there are fewer than 200 of 4,200 Marist Brothers serving in an area that the United Nations has identified as the world's poorest region when it comes to young people.

In preparation for this new venture seventeen Marist Brothers began their four month orientation program in Davo City, the Philippines on August 7, 2006. Br. Gerard Brereton from the Province of the

United States was one of the members of this group. The other sixteen Brothers came from Argentina, Australia, Germany, Ghana,


Peru, Philippines, and Spain.

While all of the Brother participants are experienced in ministry, the focus of the orientation session was to prepare them for this new and challenging ministry. As a result, the goals of the orientation program focused on the ability to grow in one's spirituality for mission ad gentes, to grow in one's ability to live in an inter-cultural and international Marist missionary community, to grow in one's relationship with oneself in a new cultural milieu, to develop an awareness and sensitivity to Marist mission and solidarity, and to develop a sensitivity and appreciation for Asian cultures, religions, and the local churches.

The overall goal of the orientation session was for each Brother to discern whether or not he was being called to the new "Mission Ad Gentes" project.

In recalling his participation in the orientation program. Br.

> Gerard explained how participation in small and large group sharing, confer-

ences on the history and spirituality of Asia, as well as days of recollection and retreat, helped him decide that he was called to be part of the "Mission Ad Gentes" effort.

Part of the orientation program involved practical, "hands on" work in the Philippines. Br. Gerard and Br. Hugo Rivera (Mexico) spent several hours each Saturday working with Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity in their work of caring for 40 boys and girls

ranging in age from new-borns to pre-teens.

At another point in the program Br. Gerard and Br. Hilario Scwab (Argentina) spent two weeks living with the Marist Brothers community at Notre Dame of Marbel University in Koronadal City.


Br. Gerard says that the most challenging and rewarding experience for him was the ten days he spent living with a Filipino family in a sea-

side village near the town of Padada, southwest of Davo City where the orientation program was held.

The culmination of the orientation program came on December 8th when Br. Gerard and the other participants were missioned by Br. Sean Sammon, our Superior General. At the missioning ceremony, Br. Gerard learned that he would be teaching English to candidates and novice Marist

Brothers in Ansan, Korea in an effort to prepare them for their ongoing education at the English Language Marist Asia Pacific Center in Manila, the Philippines.

We offer Br. Gerard and his fellow Brothers our prayerful support as they begin their new ministries in Asia.



Brother Conan Vincent Dinnean died in Miami, Florida on January 3, 2007. Brother Vincent celebrated his 66th anniversary as a Marist Brother in June 2006. Brother Vincent was born in New Haven, Connecticut in 1915 and professed his first vows as a Marist Brother in 1940. He served as a well-known and well-loved educator in Marist schools in New York City, the Bronx, Augusta,

Georgia, Trumbull, Connecticut, and Lawrence, Massachusetts.

There is much for which Br. Conan will be remembered. He had a wonderful sense of humor and had a remarkable faith which sustained him through tremendous change in both the Church and religious life. He had a remarkable ability to adapt to the changing youth to whom he ministered for almost 60 years. Most importantly, Conan loved his Brothers, and they loved him.



Brother Simeon Arthur Ouellet died in Miami, Florida on February 18, 2007. Born in Lawrence, Massachusetts in 1928, he professed his first vows as a Marist Brother in 1946. Brother Simeon served as a teacher and librarian in Marist schools in Lowell, Massachusetts, New York City, Wheeling, West Virginia,

the Bronx, Chicago, Japan, and Miami.

Turning a hobby into a career, Brother Simeon served as the archivist at the Marist Brothers General House in Rome and then as the archivist for the Province of Poughkeepsie when he returned to the States.


Although he retired in 2004, Brother Simeon was busier than ever through his energetic involvement in his local parish in Miami.



Brother Bernard Ruth died in Miami, Florida on March 26, 2007. Born in Germany, Brother Bernard made his first profession of vows in Bairo, Italy in 1958. After completing his education at Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York, Brother Bernard taught in Marist schools in Briarwood, New York and

Middle Village, New York before becoming a Floridian in 1966. From 1966 until his death, Brother Bernard served at Marist schools in Miami.

Brother Bernard was a multi-talented man who loved being a Marist Brother. He was a kind, outgoing man who loved life and lived it to the fullest.
