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## 100 DAYS Marist Brother

## 125 Years in the United States: Celebrating a Rich History

While 2011 marks the 125th anniversary of the Marist Brothers' presence in the United States, the order's connection with North America reaches all the way back to Saint Marcellin Champagnat.



After gathering the first group of Brothers in LaValla, France in 1816 to teach country children about God, Marcellin was soon eager to expand the order's reach. Marcellin first broached the idea of migrating to the United States in late 1823 or early 1824, but was rejected by the church hierarchy.

In 1886 — 46 years after Marcellin's death — the Marist Brothers arrived in the United States to staff a parish school in Lewiston, Maine. Over the next 25 years they established 10 parish schools in New England and New York. A key to the order's early growth in this country was the presence of a large French Canadian population, which sought to preserve its Catholic faith and language. (continued on page 3)

At the core of our being as Marists, "we long for belonging, solidarity, the chance to share our lives and the opportunity to change our circumstances." (*Water From the Rock*) As Marists, we "unite to create families, to support each other in our ideals, to transform our society" in the way of Mary while centered on Jesus Christ. Our Marist Young Adult Movement, which you will be reading about in this issue, is but one way we as Marists continue to foster that family spirit. Your generous support and prayers enable this family spirit to continue to grow for the next generation of Marists.

Thank you for all that you do for our Marist mission.

## Inspiring Youth

The Miami Herald lauds Br. Eladio Gonzalez and the "Squires" Service Club at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, Florida.

Senior Manuel Macias says of Br. Eladio, his school's freshman counselor, "He is a saint. You could ask him to walk on water and he could."

Br. Eladio, 73, created the Squires Service Club 19 years ago. Currently 75 hours of community service are a requirement for graduation at the school. "My goal is that the students develop themselves," says the Cuban-born Marist Brother. He transforms students into community service leaders.

Br. Eladio "is one of the most powerful and positive influences on my three sons," says Lucy Moas. Her sons are juniors and seniors at CCHS-Miami, the third son is a freshman at the University of Florida.

Brother maintains that the students and those in need are equals. "It's a relation that brings equality. That's one of the most important aspects of our club."

"When we first came to this country we worked primarily with grade schools," explained Br. Brice Byczynski, archivist. "That's where education was centered in society in general, so that's where we focused our efforts. In the early 1900s we began to branch out into high schools."

In 1911, the growth of the order in the U.S. led to the establishment of the United States Province of the Marist Brothers. "This was a very big thing," noted Br. Brice. "We were able to concentrate more on recruiting and training young people who could speak English. As a result, we focused much more on the immigrant population in the urban United States."

In the early 20th century the Brothers also began purchasing land near Poughkeepsie, New York, an area that remained the administrative and formative center of the Province for almost half a century. Today, the site remains part of the Marist College campus.

By 1959 the order had experienced phenomenal growth and had recruited 600 Brothers. To serve even more people, the U.S. Province split into two Provinces located just 10 miles apart in Poughkeepsie and Esopus, New York. Seeking to streamline operations, the two Provinces joined together again in 2003.

The worldwide Marist order received a distinctly American infusion when Br. Sean Sammon was elected Superior General of The Marist Brothers, serving from 2001 through 2009. "He would never say this was important, but I

certainly would," Br. Brice said. "He has been a great gift to our church and all of our Brothers with his energy and his vision."

Today, approximately 175 U.S. Marist Brothers count themselves among the more than 3,700 Brothers fulfilling Marcellin's mission across 78 countries on six continents. There are 14 Marist schools in the United States, as well as two summer youth camps in New Hampshire and Esopus.

The original population of French Canadians served by the order has melded into the fabric of U.S. society and the Brothers now work with diverse ethnic groups. But through the sweeping changes of the past 125 years, one thing hasn't changed — the mission of the Marist Brothers.

"Our primary mission is one of evangelization," said Br. Ben Consigli, Provincial of the U.S Province. "We not only bring Catholic students to the realization of their faith, we welcome and teach students of other faiths as well. It's all about helping them realize that they are loved by God. Our mission of making Jesus known and loved is still paramount in our ministries."

The Marist Brothers will begin to celebrate their 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary in the U.S. on Saturday, October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2011, with a liturgical celebration at Saint Jean Baptist Church in New York, New York. Other celebrations will be taking place in the regions of the Province throughout the year.

## Young Adults In Act

Young adults today often describe themselves as "spiritual but not religious." The Marist Young Adult Program challenges its participants to grow spiritually while strengthening their connection to the Marist, Christian tradition.

Most of the Marist Young Adult Program members were involved in the Marist Youth programs in their high schools. Matt Fallon, the chair of the Marist Young Adult Advisory Committee, believes that the Marist Young Adult Program offers former Marist Youth the best opportunity to continue to be Marist and that is why he stays involved. "There is something about being Marist that constantly challenges me to learn and to grow in my faith," according to Fallon, who currently teaches at the Marist Brothers' Christopher Columbus High School in Miami.

Why do others become involved in the Marist Young Adult Program? According to Jackie Fortich, Miami regional chairperson, the answer is easy, to give back. Jackie wants others to have the same good experiences that she has had since her time with the Marist community at Msgr. Pace High School. Jackie organizes monthly evenings of reflection in Miami, as well as service opportunities such as yearly participation in Walk MS and fundraising poker tournaments!

Danny Bradley, the Massachusetts regional chairperson, sees the Marist Young Adult Program as a place where he can grow as a young person. "We all have potential to do great things that make a difference and the Marist Young Adult Program gives me a chance to actualize my potential." Danny organizes gatherings in the Boston and Lawrence, Massachusetts areas for young adults to connect with others who share their Marist values.

Many other activities take place at the Marist Young Adult community in Esopus, New York where young adults come for retreats, days of reflection and service opportunities. The Esopus community also hosts a nine month service experience where young adults live, work and pray together while sharing in the retreat ministry of the Marist Brothers. According to current community member, Chris Clesca, his experience has given him the opportunity to share his passion for being Marist and for spreading the good news of the Gospel. Clesca describes his service year as "transformative" and "the only time in my life where I have been forced to take a long look in the mirror and truly decide who I want to be as a man."

Begun in September 2007, the Marist Young Adult Program invites interested young adults between the ages of 18 and 30 to explore their Christian faith through spiritual, social and service activities, both online and in person. The program has about 500 members who connect through Facebook, the Marist Young Adult Program website, or in local regions.

### Marist Youth: Model UN Gets Capitol Treatment

Thirty-four students on the Model United Nations team of Marist High School in Chicago, Illinois spent five days in Washington, DC, for the North American Invitational Model United Nations (NAIMUN). Hosted by Georgetown University and with over 3,000 students participating, NAIMUN is the largest Model United Nations conference in the Western Hemisphere. At the conference, Marist students represented Egypt and Ghana.

Mr. Duffin, club founder and moderator, said "The purpose of the club is to help students become better informed about international issues and to inspire them to pursue careers that lead to positive change in the world."

In addition to attending NAIMUN, students visited some of Washington's most important sites such as the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department, the Capitol, and the Central Intelligence Agency. At the Pentagon, students were greeted by Col. James Capparelli, a 1979 alumnus who is currently stationed there as a member of the Army Reserve.

#### **Br. Declan Murray, FMS**

Br. Declan died on February 14, 2011 after over 60 years as a Marist Brother and teacher for 55. He taught in New York, Massachusetts and Florida.

Br. Declan founded and helped run student retreats at the Marist Brothers retreat center in Esopus in upstate New York.

Most recently he taught religion and was the retreat coordinator at Archbishop Molloy High School in Queens, New York from 1975 until his retirement in 2009. He served as a friendly face and moral compass to Molloy students for decades — a constant favorite among the school's 1,500 students.



#### **Br. Kenneth Marino, FMS**

Br. Kenneth, a native of Methuen, Massachusetts died on November 10, 2010 at Lawrence General Hospital. In 2007 he celebrated 60 years as a Marist Brother.




