Welcoming Two New Marist Brothers

Brothers Robert Dittus and Ryan Richter Celebrate First Vows

ver the summer, Marist Brothers Robert Diittus and Ryan Richter professed their first vows during a ceremony held at the Marist Brothers Center in Esopus, NY. They professed the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, committing themselves for one year according to the Constitutions of the Little Brothers of Mary.



"Brothers, on the day you entered the Novitiate, you received the habit of the Little Brothers of Mary, given to our first Brothers by our founder St. Marcellin. Today, you will receive cords with three knots. A symbol of your commitment to follow Christ — poor, chaste, and obedient." Br. Dan O'Riordan (Provincial, Marist Brothers





USA) announced as he accepted Robert and Ryan's vows.

Br. Robert grew up in Queens, NY. He graduated from Marist-founded Archbishop Molloy High School before attending Saint Michael's College, where he earned a BA in Psychology in 2019. During his time at Molloy, he was able to learn a lot about the Marist Brothers and their mission, especially at retreat programs held in Esopus. Br. Rob has said "The work that the Brothers are doing is work that I find myself called to do. The Brothers have a great sense of community, not only amongst themselves, but in the larger communities they are a part of."

Br. Ryan grew up in Burkburnett, TX. His first connection to the Marist Brothers was through Br. Rob Clark, campus minister at the University of Texas in Austin, which he graduated from in 2019 with his BBA in Marketing. During his senior year, Br. Rob took a group of men, including Ryan, on a vocation pilgrimage to New York, where they spent time with a

Dear Marist Family,

Advent Blessings to each of you. As we prepare to again celebrate this sacred season of walking with the Holy Family, let us open the "inns" of our hearts and allow Jesus to again come into our world through each of us and our actions. LaValla Weekend



ver Columbus Day weekend, students and volunteers from Marist schools in New Jersey, New York, Massachusetts, Florida, Illinois, and Texas, as well as one of the Marist schools from Quebec, Canada,

The theme involved looking at past LaValla weekends and what they have taught us about familial displacement, acts of war, and natural disasters. Participants went through a simulation experience to understand the ideal "Utopia" and how economic inequality has a great impact on our world. Returning to the original theme of LaValla, students and volunteers also spent time working on various service projects around the Esopus property. The biggest project was digging the holes that will be the foundation for solar panels that will be installed later outside some of the houses on the property. This is a huge step in the effort to move Esopus in the direction of more sustainable energy.

variety of religious orders. Br. Ryan recalls "In the Marist communities and ministries we visited I felt immediately at home. The sense of community, mission, and passion these Brothers held was inspiring. I fell in love and I had to try it out."

Brothers Robert and Ryan entered the Marist Brothers Postulancy in September 2020 and lived in community with Brothers in the Bronx, NY. They became Novices to the Marist Brothers on September 12, 2021 and lived at the Marist Brothers Novitiate on the campus of Marist College in Poughkeepsie, NY with the late Brother Sean Sammon serving as the Master of Novices. In the fall of 2022, they moved to the Saint Barnabas Community in the Bronx, NY, where Br. Don Bisson served as Master of Novices.

This fall, Br. Robert is teaching religion at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, FL and Br. Ryan is teaching religion at Saint Joseph Academy in Brownsvile, TX. During the next year they will continue to discern their calls to a lifetime commitment as Marist Brothers.

IN MEMORIAM

Br. Henry Sawicki

Marist Brother and former educator Br. Henry Sawicki, FMS, died on October 8, 2023, at the age of 77. He was a Marist Brother for 54 years.

Br. Henry was born in Brooklyn, NY and entered the Marist

Brothers Novitiate in 1963 in Esopus, NY, before receiving the Marist Habit in August 1964 and professing first vows in 1965. In 1968, he received a BA in Biology from Marist College, and he received an MA in Biology from Fairfield University in 1975.

Like many Marist Brothers, Br. Henry served in several Marist Ministries, where he had the chance to impact the lives of thousands of young people. He especially enjoyed being a sailing instructor and assistant waterfront director at Camp Marist in Effingham, NH, where we worked over the summer for more than 50 years! Br. Henry also worked at several schools, including Saint Joseph High School in Trumbell, CT (1973), John A. Coleman High School in Kingston, NY, (1973-1985), Bishop Carroll High School in Ebensburg, PA (1986), Marist High School in Bayonne, NJ (1986), and Our Lady of Lourdes High School in Poughkeepsie, NY (1996-2015).

Br. Henry professed perpetual vows in Esopus, NY, in 1974 and attended a second Novitiate at the Marist Spirituality Center in Manziana, Italy, in 1995. After retiring, he moved to our Marist community in Manhasset, NY.
