INTRODUCTION:

In his 2015 Encyclical, *Laudato Si': On Care for our Common Home*, Pope Francis states that "Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience" (217). These words remind us that our call to care for creation is an essential part of Christian life and the life of the Church. In his 2023 Apostolic Exhortation, *Laudate Deum*, Pope Francis makes plain that this vocation requires the Church, at every level, to take bold, urgent, and faith-filled action.

The spirit of *Laudato Si'* has deep roots in the Marist charism, which emerged among rural Christians from the French countryside in the early 19th century. As Marists, we seek to embody what St. Marcellin Champagnat called a "simple and down-to-earth spirituality" grounded in the Four Pillars of Presence, Simplicity, Family Spirit, and Love of Work (WFR, n.23). We look to our own Brother François – the first Superior General of the Marist Brothers, and an herbalist and infirmarian – as an exemplar for what it means to live out this ecological spirituality.

Brother François spent his early life working on a farm, tending to sheep and lambs, nurturing a deep sensitivity to ecological spirituality. He advised the early Brothers to "watch, listen, and hear" to contemplate the natural world. He likened the heavens to "an immense temple that God has raised up for his glory" (Br. François, Notebook n. 303, p. [560]). He was attentive to the movement of leaves, the songs of birds, the fragrance of flowers, the behavior of animals, and the changing of seasons. He marveled at the profound bond between humans and nature, writing that, "Humans live on air and breathe it constantly" (Br. François, Notebook n. 303, p. [676]).

Brother François experienced God at work in nature. He once observed a farmer who, after planting seeds in the field, could only wait and hope for "the precious produce of the land," and for God to "send the rains of the first and last seasons" (Br. François, Personal Letters, T2. 1664, Notebook of Letters n. 7, p. 1076). He wrote that, "The study of medicine has led me to praise God, who has given healing power to different remedies" (Br. François, Notebook n. 301, p. [77]). Br. François recognized and praised God at work in planting, in the land and its produce, in the rains and the seasons, and in the healing properties of various herbs. Near the end of his life, he wrote: "God in everything; God everywhere; God alone, and my conscience as I face eternity" (Br. François, Notebook n. 302, p. [166]). Like St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology, Br. François invites us to see the goodness of God in all creatures.

In *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis connects ecological spirituality with a call to embrace "a prophetic and contemplative lifestyle, one capable of deep enjoyment free from the obsession with consumption" (LS, 222). Br. François embodied this ethic in his own time, advising early Marist Brothers to, "Eat less and chew more to aid digestion and maintain health; this is a good recipe for healing or preventing illnesses" (Br. François, Notebook n. 301, p. [149]). He also reflected that, "Being a happy person, engaging in gentle exercises, and having modest meals are three reliable medicines" (Br. François, Notebook n. 301, p. [86]). Br. François believed that a healthy body and a sound spiritual life are achieved through moderation, temperance, and discipline—virtues essential for resisting consumerism and protecting Mother Earth.



CALL FROM OUR MARIST INSTITUTE

In light of the ecological crisis, The General Chapter calls Marists for an urgent change to “live based on an integral ecology (LS, ch. I)”; to move away from a culture shaped by “ego-s’ and adopt that of the ‘eco-s’ (ecology, ecosystems, and economy of solidarity).” We must “awaken in ourselves and those around us an ecological awareness that engages us in caring for ‘our common home”

In response to this call, and with firm trust in the work of the Holy Spirit, the Marist Brothers USA marks the 10th anniversary of Laudato Si' with its Province-wide Laudato Si' Action Plan. The plan is comprised of three main components: 1) Province Commitments; 2) Laudato Si' Action Plans from all USA Marist ministries; and 3) Laudato Si' Action Plans from all USA Communities.

The Province is committed to living the 7 goals of Laudato Si in the following ways:

Goal 1: Response to the Cry of the Earth

- The Province will promote sustainable lifestyles and best practices among all its communities and Marist Ministries.
- All Province Team Members and individual Marist Communities will participate in our recently established Carbon Offset Program.
 - In 2024, we announced our Marist Brothers USA Carbon Offset Program to help compensate for the environmental costs of travel in solidarity with the [Laudato Si' Action Platform](#). With the help of the [Catholic Climate Covenant](#), this program is an effort to work toward a Net Zero Emissions pathway for the Province. All Province staff are currently logging their car and air travel emissions annually which subsequently is now being offset by the planting of trees across the Province.
- The Province is committed to annually donating to programs which directly respond to the Cry of the Earth, including The MBCE, Blue Missions, and Magnificat Farm.

Goal 2: Response to the Cry of the Poor

- The Province will promote annual Marist Solidarity Projects which will raise needed awareness among all in our Province about how our Marist Institute is responding to many of our poorest and most marginalized Brothers and Sisters. Our Solidarity efforts will also raise needed funds annually to support these worthy projects.
- The Province will continue to support the MBCE and its Mid-Hudson Valley Camps which serve many of the most marginalized populations in our country, including mentally and physically disabled persons, children with cancer, and impoverished children living in our inner cities.
- The Province will promote and support opportunities for all Province Members including Marists of Champagnat and young people to directly serve those most in need by means of volunteer opportunities including immersion experiences and Mission trips.
- The Province will continue to support two Marist Brothers from our Missionary Areas to avail of post graduate degrees at Marist College.

- The Province is committed to continue to directly and indirectly work with and support immigrants, refugees and migrants in all possible ways such as our current work in El Paso and Brownsville.
- The Province is committed to continue to provide needed assistance and relief to communities during emergency disasters such as our efforts to the victims of the earthquake in Syria in 2023, victims of devastating flooding in Eastern Kentucky in 2024, victims of the fires in California this year.

Goal 3: Ecological Economics

- The Province will ensure that its Finance and Investment Teams utilize the Best Practices of Catholic Social Teaching and its Guidelines in all Financial matters.
- Likewise, each of our Marist Ministries will utilize similar Guidelines.
- The Provincial Council is committed to utilizing appropriate Province financial resources to needed Marist Programs that promote the goals of Laudato Si, such as support for an annual Earth Day Weekend, Ecology Grants to Marist Schools, donations to Marist Solidarity Projects, etc.

Goal 4: Adoption of Sustainable Lifestyles

- As stated in Wherever You Go, our Marist Brothers Rule of Life (18), "Assume a simple and sober style of life and protect life in all of creation. Care for nature, be actively concerned about the environment, defend those who are poor and promote human development."
- As Marists we are called to live a spirituality of Simplicity and, like St. Marcellin Champagnat, to respond to the signs of our times. We commit ourselves to adopting simple and sustainable lifestyles so that we might better care for our Common Home and more profoundly witness such values to all who enter our lives, especially young people.

Goal 5: Ecological Education

- The Province will provide resources to all USA Marist Schools on promoting Ecological Education (see [USA Marist Integral Ecology Resources](#)) as well as how to teach the principles of Laudato Si' across school curricula.
- The Province is committed to sponsoring an annual Earth Day weekend in Esopus to inspire young people from our ten USA Marist Schools to become leaders in our Marist Ecology efforts
- The Province is committed to employing Mr. Sam King as the Province-wide Ecology Coordinator and to utilize his gifts and deep passion and knowledge in the area of Ecology as a resource to all USA Marist Ministries.
- The Province Coordinator of Ecology will work with our other USA Marist Ministries to assist them in developing ways they can promote ecological learning to the young people each of those ministries serve.
- The Province will offer Ecology Resources through its weekly Province Newsletter, Friday Notes.

Goal 6: Ecological Spirituality

- The Province will promote Ecological Spirituality by sharing appropriate reflective readings in its monthly Religious Calendar.
- The Province will provide Ecologically themed Prayer Services on special occasions such as the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, Earth Day, Laudato Si Week, the Season of Creation, etc.
- The Province will offer Ecology Resources including spiritual reflections through its weekly Province Newsletter, Friday Notes.

Goal 7: Community Resilience and Empowerment

- The Province will engage young people and adults, who have a deep passion for ecology, from across the USA Province to be part of the Province Green Team, which will serve as a Ecological Think Tank for the Province and assist the Province to move forward in its commitment to the Principles of Laudato Si'.
- The Province is committed to providing annual Ecology Grants to each of our Marist Schools to empower young people to creatively embrace the principles of Laudato Si' with new ecological initiatives on their local level.
- The Province will engage with Marist Ecological efforts within our Arco Norte Region as well as with the wider Institute.
- The Province will, when possible, engage with other Ecological organizations such as the Catholic Climate Covenant and the Laudato Si' Movement.

Province Plans

The second dimension of the plan calls for Province Leadership to work with all USA Marist ministries and communities to ensure they develop local Laudato Si' Action Plans. These plans articulate how each community, in its own context and with God's people, plans to pursue the Seven Goals of Laudato Si' in simple and profound ways. All plans can be found in the pages that follow.

The Laudato Si' Action Planning Process

Bearing in mind the diversity of ministries and communities across the Province, the Laudato Si' planning process aims to create a simple process in which all ministries and communities could participate.

Laudato Si' Action Platform and the Seven Goals of Laudato Si'

The Marist Brothers USA is enrolled in the Laudato Si' Action Platform and requested that each individual USA Marist Ministry and Marist community enroll as well. The Laudato Si' Action Platform is an initiative of the Vatican Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development with the goal of helping create Laudato Si' Action Plans based on the Seven Goals of Laudato Si'.

Goal 1: Response to the Cry of the Earth

The response to the cry of the earth is a call to protect our common home for the wellbeing of all, as we equitably address the climate crisis, biodiversity loss, and ecological sustainability.

Goal 2: Response to the Cry of the Poor

The response to the cry of the poor is a call to promote eco-justice, aware that we are called to defend human life from conception to death, and all forms of life on earth.

Goal 3: Ecological Economics

Ecological economics acknowledges that the economy plays an important role in protecting the well-being of our common home. Actions could include purchasing sustainability produced goods, ethical investments, and protecting the dignity of workers.

Goal 4: Adoption of Sustainable Lifestyles

The adoption of sustainable lifestyles is grounded in the idea that in our personal lives and in communal life, we can make intentional choices regarding our use of resources and energy that can promote the well-being of the planet.

Goal 5: Ecological Education

Ecological education prioritizes formation and educational opportunities that promote ecological awareness and transformative action.

Goal 6: Ecological Spirituality

Ecological spirituality springs from a profound ecological conversion and helps us to discover God in all things.

Goal 7: Community Resilience and Empowerment

Community resilience and empowerment promotes active and conscious involvement and participatory action to care for creation at the local, regional, national, and international levels.

The Province Plan Format

Informed by a community assessment and listening session, each community plan is comprised of two main elements: the Laudato Si' Statement and Commitments for all USA Marist schools and communities. The Community Laudato Si Statement articulates why caring for creation is important to that individual community. The Community Commitments are new or continued tangible undertakings discerned by the local teams of each Marist Ministry or local Marist community. Local teams were asked to follow the acronym SMART when developing their commitments: they should be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant to the Goals of Laudato Si', and Time-bound. Having measurable goals with timeframes will help each community monitor their progress and, each year during the Season of Creation, update and evaluate their plans.

School Laudato Si' Statement: Care of Creation is important to the entire Christopher Columbus Explorers

Community because the Earth is our common home and caring for it means caring for all the people, plants, and animals within it. At Columbus, we seek justice for all, especially the marginalized, and caring for all creation ensures the problems and challenges of all people are addressed. We commit to making Care for Creation a part of our school identity and to engage in Province wide efforts as well as local efforts to protect our Common Home.

Goal 1: Response to the Cry of the Earth

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** To continue to embrace the comprehensive circular economy recycling program that was established at Columbus in 2024. Through this program all plastic waste collected at the school is tracked and subsequently re-introduced to Columbus as repurposed plastic in the form of lanyards, sportswear and other needed items.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: School Administration
- **Commitment:** To embrace recycling with collection of aluminum cans through our partnership with a local upcycling company. Through this program all aluminum can waste collected at the school is tracked and donated to a company that recycles the aluminum into new products.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: School Administration

Goal 2: Response to the Cry of the Poor

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** To continue to provide opportunities for students to participate in Blue Missions and other Mission trips; Opportunities to serve others through the school's extensive Service Program with such activities as Special Olympic events, Junior Day of Service, Children's Hospital toy and food drive, distributing diabetes kits to the homeless, holiday events for children in the foster care system, etc.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Campus Ministry Team, Director of Service Outreach Programs, MAS Program
- **Commitment:** To continue to participate in Province-wide Solidarity efforts which annually raises awareness of many of our poorest and most marginalized Marist Projects in the world as well as raised need funds to support those projects.

- **Commitment:** Christopher Columbus is committed to the implementation of a Sustainable Procurement Policy which will ensure the school's reduction of waste generation and landfill dependence; Support suppliers that prioritize ethical labor practices, environmental stewardship, and local economic resilience; and Model environmental leadership in education and practice for our students, staff, and broader community.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: School Administration, School Board Members, Ms. Christine Taylor

- **Commitment:** Christopher Columbus will continue to ensure that all new construction will meet the standards of being certified as Gold LEED buildings.

- **Commitment:** Christopher Columbus will continue to expand its breakthrough circular economy recycling program and incorporate the recycling of aluminium cans.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Facilities Department, Ms. Christine Taylor
- **Commitment:** Christopher Columbus will continue to expand its commitment to ecological sustainability by maintaining its many water refilling stations, solar powered charging stations across campus, and LED Lighting throughout the campus.
 - Timeframe: Ongoing

- **Commitment:** As Christopher Columbus continues to plan for future building and campus improvements, it commits to expanding its natural green space.

- **Commitment:** The MBCE will continue to ensure that LED Lighting is utilized throughout the entire MBCE Facilities
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Tomas O’Riordan, MBCE Building and Grounds Committee.
- **Commitment:** The MBCE will continue to expand its usage of solar based energy when possible and practical
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Tomas O’Riordan, MBCE Building and Grounds Committee.
- **Commitment:** The MBCE will commit to expand the use of Water refilling stations throughout the entire MBCE Facilities
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Tomas O’Riordan, MBCE Building and Grounds Committee.
- **Commitment:** The MBCE will commit to expand its recycling efforts and seek a more sustainable way to utilize food waste
 - Timeframe: Ongoing

- **Commitment:** The MBCE will continue to utilize the unused food from retreat groups or camps and share with local homeless shelters on a timely basis
 - Timeframe: Ongoing

- **Commitment:** The MBCE will continue to host such ecological educational programs as the annual Province Earth Day weekend
 - Timeframe: Ongoing
 - Person or Group Responsible: Tomas O’Riordan, Province Green Team Members

- **Commitment:** The MBCE will implement an educational series on local ecological interests for interested visitors to the property and share these via simple QR codes distributed in key locations on the property such as adjacent to the Hudson River, near the permanent eagles' nest on the property, or adjoining native plants or trees
 - Timeframe: Ongoing

- **Commitment:** The MBCE will develop a simple fact sheet on sustainable efforts at the MBCE and circulate this information at key locations on the property such as in bedrooms, scullery, bathrooms, etc.

- **Commitment:** We believe that first and foremost, addressing this goal requires adequate education around the issues of climate crisis, biodiversity loss, and ecological sustainability. Our commitment to this goal will be to develop an ecological curriculum that partners with appropriate academic departments within our school to do this effectively to our entire student body.
 - a. **English** → Nature writing (Transcendentalism), eco-poetry, analysis of ecological forms of media, maybe a book that the English Teachers would recommend (Outside Reading)
 - b. **Science** → Have a guest speaker come into science classes to teach mini-lessons about ecosystems, biodiversity, and climate change. Once a week for a few weeks at the start of the year
 - c. **Theology Department** → Utilizing resources and writings such as Laudato Si, the Creation story, as well as Catholic Eco-Spiritual writers such as Thomas Berry and partnering with the local Thomas Berry Forum (run out of Iona University), to be able to teach why caring for our common home is directly related to our Catholic Identity
- Timeframe: Ongoing
- Person or Group Responsible: The Academic Council, and respective Department Chairs of said academic departments

Goal 2: Response to the Cry of the Poor

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We believe that this goal is directly related to advocacy around ecological issues and ecological justice and societal justice. Therefore, we propose a plan that will use student ambassadors of the Green Team to promote “hot-topic” ecological issues to demonstrate advocacy around the school that will both educate and galvanize student support around these global issues and initiatives.
 - a. **Posters around the school** promoting the Green Team, as well as highlighting facts about hot topic ecological issues
 1. Additional website links and possible donation links focused on ecology and protecting the earth that are added to the Mount Saint Michael Website (essentially starting web-campaigns to promote these issues)
 - b. **Hosting an Ecology Week & Creating an Earth Day event:** For a week, science
 1. Classes from junior high to high school will prepare projects to present on ecological issues, akin to the science fairs. Alongside this grand lobby of projects, there will be an Earth Day-themed cafe in the gym.
 2. Collaborate with the National Honor Society & Student Council ii. Students come in during lunch mods.
 3. Conduct a contest where students vote through a poll on best project and most important issue
 4. The winning class will receive a dress-down day
 - c. **Mini Projects**
 1. Eco-Poetry Wall→ For over a week, a wall in the gym will be decorated with an ecology theme and poetry attached to it to spread awareness about a particular ecological issue. Students will pass by and see the wall and the poetry that comes with it.
- Timeframe: Ongoing
- Person or Group Responsible: Green Team & the Science Department, as well as the National Honors Society and Student Council

Goal 3: Ecological Economics

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We believe that this goal is best achieved by demonstrating within our school exactly how cost-effective and fruitful “green initiatives” can be, by using some of our physical plant to generate funds that will go right back into our operating account, “paying it forward” to educate and motivate students that “caring for our common home” actually saves us money, and can generate money, directly reducing our carbon footprint while generating funds to support our school.

a. **Promoting and utilizing the installation of our Solar Panels** (across the roof of our gym) and educating students on how solar energy works, while also educating them on how utilizing solar energy can be cost effective on increasingly high electricity bills in NYC.

1. “Lights off” Days → On particularly sunny days, we could use natural light instead of the LED Lights to light up the classrooms. The School uses natural light, which cuts costs, reduces energy use, and raises awareness about electricity consumption. We can leave the blinds open and lights on for hallways and stairways. This will start a conversation, and a buzz about our own utilizing of electricity, and hoping to inspire others to do this in their home, leading to talks on the environment.

2. Recycling Initiative - For the past two years, the Green Team has successfully started and sustained a recycling program, where the Green Team ambassadors collect all of the plastic bottles from classrooms, twice a week, and bring them to our local recycling center, in exchange for money. The funds have been donated directly back to the Marist Solidarity initiatives each year. (*This is a way for students to also receive Community Service hours through Campus Ministry.)

- Timeframe: Ongoing
- Person or Group Responsible: Green Team & the Science Department, as well as the National Honors Society and Student Council

Goal 4: Adoption of Sustainable Lifestyles

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We believe that this goal is best achieved through action, and modeling more “green-centered” intentional living. It is our goal to create these initiatives (alongside the ones that are ongoing mentioned above), that will spark students’ curiosity, and demonstrate, how small ways of living eco-friendly can make large impacts to the health and well-being of our Earth.

- a. Take schoolwide surveys of ecological changes that students would like to see implemented (more students are interested in sustainability than you think)
 - 1. Zero-waste lunches → Encourage Students to bring lunches without disposable packaging (plastic sandwich bags, plastic juice/drink bottles, etc.)
 - 2. Small Things initiative → Creating classroom windowsill herb gardens, seed jars, or mason jar plants, and growing plants in cups, similar to how we used to when we were younger in elementary school, and highlight these classrooms and spaces to our community in our weekly “Mount Updates” to continue to highlight, celebrate and educate the severity of how “going-green” is important to our Mount community.
- o Timeframe: Ongoing
- o Person or Group Responsible: Green Team & the Science Department, as well as the National Honors Society and Student Council

Goal 5: Ecological Education

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We believe that this goal is directly tied into education. So, alongside the inter-curriculum practices we implement listed above, within the Theology Department, we will create a Laudato Si curriculum where all students (6th-12th) will take on a focus on one of the seven principles of Laudato Si per year, embedded in our religion curriculum framework. Along with some of the fieldwork experiences we hope to create in the 25/26 school year outlined below.
 - a. Organize field trips to botanical gardens, wildlife sanctuaries, waste management facilities and sustainable farms
 - b. Continuing our efforts with SUGI, a company that has already mapped-out and developed a designated space on our campus to plant a pocket garden, creating a biodiverse habitat directly on our campus
 - c. Continuing the “Small Things” initiative by:
 - 1. Creating a Butterfly enclosure on our campus
 - 2. Growing plants in cups during science classes
- o Timeframe: Ongoing
- o Person or Group Responsible: The Maintenance Staff (working with SUGI), the Theology Department & Campus Ministry, and any other person or Department who wishes to participate in the “Small Things” initiative.

Goal 6: Ecological Spirituality

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We believe that this goal will be embedded throughout all of the initiatives of each of our respective proposed goals, as the Green Team's mission is deeply rooted in our Catholic identity and faith through the Laudato Si document itself. However, Campus Ministry will be taking an active role in the Green Team, as well as designing worship around our Earth, and highlighting the Catholic nature of our Green Team's mission.
 1. Celebrating the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi
 2. Hosting an Earth Day Mass
- Timeframe: Ongoing
- Person or Group Responsible: Campus Ministry & the Theology Department

Goal 7: Community Resilience and Empowerment

We commit to the following efforts to embrace this goal:

- **Commitment:** We hope that active and conscious participation and involvement with our Green Team and its initiatives will come through the buzz of embedding eco-conscious initiatives within our school's culture. But, through our efforts, we will continue to motivate and energize student and faculty involvement in these initiatives by honoring their efforts, highlighting their efforts, and offering incentives for these initiatives where applicable as outlined below.
 1. Hosting contests for the Eco-Poetry wall such as a free dress down day or free lunch
 2. Awarding service hours for those who participate in eco-centric community service or our recycling program
 3. Highlighting classrooms or individual faculty members who take on the "Small Things" initiatives in our weekly newsletter to parents, and within our annual report to highlight this support to our Alumni, Board and donor-base.
- Timeframe: Ongoing
- Person or Group Responsible: The Green Team, Campus Ministry & our Administration
